

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Dean B. Eggert, Attorney Extensive Experience in School Law

Dean has extensive experience representing school districts in the areas of general school law and federal special education law. Dean served as legal counsel for the City of Manchester School District from 1985 to 2008 and handled the litigation which led to the establishment of the District as a distinct corporate entity. Dean has authored numerous articles in the field of school law and speaks both locally and nationally on federal special education law and other school law issues. Since the adoption of more comprehensive Anti-Bullying laws he has spoken extensively on the implications of the new laws. He is certified as a mediator and has served as a court-appointed mediator in over 80 cases. He is AV rated and was recently selected by his peers as one the Best Lawyers in America in the field of municipal law.

Dean has served on a number of nonprofit boards and is active in local, national and global relief projects. He earned a BA in Communications from Wheaton College and received his JD from the University of California at Los Angeles where he served as a member of the UCLA Law Review from 1983-1985.

He is admitted to practice in New Hampshire, the United States District Court, District of New Hampshire, the First Circuit Court of Appeal, and the Supreme Court of the United States.

Richard W. Cole, principal of Cole Civil Rights and Safe Schools Consulting in Boston, Massachusetts, www.colecivilrights.com, is a nationally known civil rights attorney, former Assistant Attorney General and Civil Rights Division Chief in Massachusetts. Richard offers a broad range of training, policy development, investigative and technical assistance to educators and law enforcement throughout the U.S. on promoting school safety, civil rights, educational equity, disability rights, race relations, discrimination and in addressing harassment, bullying and hate crimes in schools and cyberspace. He also provides legal assistance to parents whose children are targets of harassment or bullying. Richard has extensive investigative, training and litigation experience and has published widely on civil rights issues. Richard was national co-chair of the federal-state effort resulting in the acclaimed U.S. Department of Education's publication, "Protecting Students from Harassment and Hate Crime – A Guide for Schools." He also co-chaired the "Massachusetts Safe Schools Initiative," a multidisciplinary collaboration to provide educators the tools they need to address harassment, bullying and hate crimes in schools.



Investigating Bullying and Harassment; What's Legally Required; What Works!

State and federal law imposes requirements for schools to appropriately investigate and address bullying and harassment. This session will identify legally perilous practices and provide guidance to help ensure student safety and compliance with the law. Applicable for superintendents, legal counsel for school districts and families, principals, educators, school resource officers, and all safe school community members interested in aligning school and community policy and practice with current MA state law.



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
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Paul Poteat, PhD

Paul Poteat is Assistant Professor in the Department of Counseling, Developmental, and Educational Psychology at Boston College. His research examines bias-based bullying and victimization among middle school and high school students. His work has identified individual factors that predict this behavior, instances of peer socialization, and patterns of change in this behavior over time. His work also examines the mental health and academic outcomes among those who experience bias-based victimization and factors that promote their resilience. His work has been published in the areas of educational, developmental, counseling, and social psychology, and has been used to inform school-based antibullying policies.

Jeff Perrotti, MA, CAS

Jeff Perrotti is the founding director of the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education's Safe Schools Program for Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, and Transgender Students. He is the co-author of the book, When the Drama Club is not Enough. Jeff has conducted numerous workshops on sexual orientation for school administrators, counselors, nurses, coaches, teachers, parents and students. Jeff teaches at Harvard University, where he has received several awards for excellence in teaching. Jeff is a consultant for the Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education and the Massachusetts Commission on GLBT Youth.





Bias-Based Bullying: Consequences and Prevention

What are the added consequences and implications when bullying is biasbased? What interventions are effective in preventing and responding to biasbased bullying? Emerging findings highlight the often biased and discriminatory nature of bullying. A panel of researchers, students, parents, and school personnel will address:

- the magnified mental health, social, and academic risks associated with bullying when it is biased
- factors that foster resilience among lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender students, and other students who experience bias-based mistreatment
- strategies for responding to bullying related to gender identity/expression, sexual orientation, and other forms of bias

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Randy Ross, MS, MA Equity & Diversity Specialist at the New England Equity Assistance Center, The Education Alliance at Brown University

Randy Ross is an Equity & Diversity Specialist at the New England Equity Assistance Center, The Education Alliance at Brown University. Randy's work focuses on implementing an equity-centered school climate model, which includes the importance of distinguishing between bullying and discriminatory harassment. She provides training and technical assistance to schools, districts, and state departments of education on gender equity, intergroup conflict, cultural proficiency, social-emotional learning, and stakeholder collaboration. Previously, Randy worked for the New Jersey Attorney General's Office of Bias Crime and Community Relations, where she initiated and led "New Jersey Cares About Bullying," a statewide, state-sponsored coalition. She received her B.A. and M.A. in Anthropology from the University of California at Berkeley and an M.S. in Educational Leadership from the Bank Street College of Education in New York City. Randy is a member of the National School Climate Council.



How Does an Equity-Centered School Climate Framework Support a Positive Environment for Students in the "Legally Protected Classes?"

In this final session, the presenter will describe a school climate framework for incorporating equity concerns, particularly those concerning the emotional and physical safety of students in the legally protected classes (based on race, color, religion, ethnicity/national origin, sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity). Included will be discussion of:

- How the term "bullying" confuses educators' understanding of their responsibilities to prevent "discriminatory harassment"
- School climate and the civil rights concept of "hostile environment"
- Steps schools can take to reduce the potential of complaints to the Office of Civil Rights (OCR);
- Integrating the key ideas of the day's sessions within the equity-centered school climate framework.
